Survey Says... Thanks to everyone who filled out the survey! The summary of responses is printed in this issue. I didn't include *all* comments that were sent, just mostly due to space limitations and editorial reasons, but most of them are there. Thanks to the survey we've gotten some volunteers who are interested in helping out with CST things, and we've started a new Yahoo email group, called CST_Volunteers@yahoo.com. Feel free to join! Our first project is going to be a kissing and/or tarot booth at FallFling, and we're looking for volunteers to help out. We'd also like to have a silent auction there, so donations of items would be great!

BOD Minutes: If you will read over the minutes on page 4, you'll find that we had quite an active and productive meeting! We have tons of ideas, and really need some volunteers to help out.

Membership Drive: On the theory that there is strength in numbers, CST is having a membership drive! This drive will last until Samhain (November 1), and will be repeated each year from Lamas (August 1) till Samhain (November 1). If you join or renew during this time, Individual memberships are just \$12.50 (normally \$20), and Family memberships are \$20 (normally \$35). All memberships are good for one year. Tell your friends!

Membership Expiration Date: You can always find the date of the expiration of your membership on the back of the newsletter, on your mailing label. It's always listed underneath your name and address, in italics, like this: *Individual 10-31-2003*. Each time a newsletter is due to be mailed out, I go through the list of members, and check the expiration dates. Those that are coming up within the next 2-3 months get a letter mailed with their newsletter reminding them to renew. Those whose memberships have already expired get a postcard reminder, but no newsletter. Letters will be sent at least once, sometimes twice; postcards are sent only once. Those who do not renew their memberships after 30 days are considered inactive. So please remember to renew!

Disaster Relief: This take two parts: 1) collecting household items (no clothes) to give to community members in times of need; and 2) collecting monetary donations to send checks to disaster relief agencies (mostly Red Cross) in the wake of disasters. To help with these efforts, we need to collect items and build up our Disaster Relief Fund. We will have donations boxes for items and money at FallFling and other upcoming festivals and gathering. Please consider donating to effort—all donations are tax-deductible (remember to ask for a receipt!).

Pagan Prisoner Committee: Join this committee! Write letters! Be an important link to members on the inside!! Currently, the members of the Pagan Prisoner Committee are Cliff Landis, Violet Jade, Nion, Eugene Chapman, and Tarl Hoch. The purpose of the committee is to help out our incarcerated members. We have a web page where we list addresses of those inmates who wish to receive letters and information, linked to the CST web site. If you'd like to be part of this committee, just email and let us know!

Want to Review Books? CST receives new books from various publishers quite often. The publishers are hoping we'll read these books, and publish a review in our newsletter. *I* don't have time to read all these, but if someone else would, that'd be great! Who Are We?

Church of the Spiral Tree (CST) is a non-profit, volunteer-staffed, ecumenical pagan/wiccan church, designed to foster and celebrate a sense of community and family among pagans, both locally and in other regions of the country/world. CST celebrates the unique pagan family: parents, children, elders, and extended family. It is an ecumenical church in that it encompasses all traditions, and is non-exclusive. It welcomes all who revere the Earth Mother and adhere to the tenets of the Wiccan Rede (“An it harm none, do as you will”), regardless of which tradition one is affiliated with.

CST was incorporated in August 1997 to provide a legal, tax-exempt status to the Pagan community. This status enables us to offer to the community a variety of open rituals that anyone may attend, to ordain ministers, and to extend our tax-exempt status to sub-groups of CST. One of our projects has been the forming of a Pagan cover school program for homeschooling families in Alabama (Sacred Grove Academy). CST also has a Disaster Relief Fund, so we can collectively donate money in the name of an established Pagan church to disaster relief efforts, including the American Red Cross.

If you would like to help with any of our projects, have any further ideas for the church, or have any resources which would be of benefit, please contact us. CST is also seeking volunteers to help with various parts of the church. Call us with ideas!

Info About Our Services:

Ministers: CST, being a church, may ordain any member over the age of 18 a minister. The fee for this is \$35.00, and you must also be a paid member. This ordination is for life; you do not have to maintain your membership to continue to be a CST minister, but we would really appreciate it. Each year we have to renew our “Registered” status in various states in order for our ministers to be legal, and your continued membership fees help pay for this. Ministers are entitled to perform legal weddings, baptisms, and funerals. Ordination as a minister does not automatically confer “Elder” or “High Priest/ess” status upon anyone.

Subordinate Organizations: The main form of a local CST group is a Grove. This can be formed by at

least three paid church members, who apply to CST for a charter. If you are interested in forming a Grove, simply find two other like-minded friends, and encourage them to send in their membership to CST, then apply to us for a Grove charter. The application and first year’s fee is \$35.00. Note that whomever forms a Grove and runs it, including writing and performing rituals and teaching mysteries, does not automatically become a “High Priest/ess.”

My oldest son has been having a hard time staying on task with his school work. He avoids homework like the plague. MINUTES

CST Board of Directors

August 24, 2003

The meeting was called to order by Cathy Rankin at 1:15 pm, at Auburn, Alabama, with the following Directors and guests present:

Cathy Rankin, President; Don Mikovitz (Nion), Vice-President; Linda C. Kerr, Secretary-Treasurer; Lee Mikovitz, Craig Kerr, and Rowan Kerr.

Ideas & Things To Do

Linda has compiled a list of things that were suggested we do, from past BOD meetings. All present looked over this list. Also looked over the summary of the CST Survey, with names listed as to who volunteered to do what.

We should start doing a gift exchange/giveaway at Yule. We had talked about this before, but never implemented it. We will need to put a note about this in the newsletter and the flyer. If we want people to bring canned goods, we'll need to note that in the ritual and festival flyers.

We need a new sign for the gate at Waverly; something weather-resistant, that can stay outside the whole time.

Cliff or Violet Jade need to contact each prison chaplain and official to see what is allowed as far as books.

We could use a notary public, just to be available to the community if needed, at festivals and rituals. Willow Blue is a notary. We will ask on the list who else is.

It would be good to work with colleges in various areas, to join forces with student pagan groups or just do CST rituals in their area.

We should make a separate CST display for both Cathy and Nion and others so they will have one available themselves for any functions they attend.

Need Volunteers

We need someone to be in charge of things: collecting canned goods, speaking at rituals, etc. Nion can collect things at festivals, and perhaps Kathryn in Auburn and Ellen in Columbus can collect items in their areas. We need boxes to collect things, that will be colorful and decorated. We need to make sure the folks who volunteered to do this will be able to store things.

For someone to speak at rituals, we should have a Hospitality and/or Publicity person. We could get someone to sign up for each ritual so one person doesn't always have to do it. Give them a cheat-sheet, with info about CST, the library, and upcoming things. Maybe we could ask the membership for birthdays, anniversaries, etc. on the membership form, or better yet, upload it to the Yahoo group (CST_Volunteers and friendly_pagans). Find someone to email, call, or write to get news and birthdays, etc.

We need a Volunteer Coordinator (not Linda)—maybe one for rituals, publicity, hospitality, CST party, etc, and one for charity, fundraising, collecting and storing items, etc. Lee decided to be the Volunteer Coordinator for the latter. These coordinators can then upload info to the Yahoogroups, listing who has storage for what, etc.

We need a librarian, to keep up the library, keep track of books, remind people to return books, put the list on the Yahoogroups, etc. Densho was volunteered to be the librarian. Let's check into buying or finding a small building for Waverly to house the library, that will have more room than the current storage room it's in. Keep it sprayed or treated for bugs and mice, and still keep the books in plastic tubs for protection, but have shelves and a table to put the boxes on to look through them.

Our publicity person, when we find one, can send cards to potential donors

Things to Buy

We can make CST nametags, and permanent ID pins for BOD and staff members. If not an actual pin, then a magnet, or tag hanging from a cord.

Cathy will get us an easy-up tent pavilion for a CST booth, and we'll paint CST on it so it'll be recognizable. She'll also pick up a couple of small folding tables. There was discussion about coordinating with Serpentstone and maybe keeping common tables and pavilions at Dragon Hills, but it was generally decided that we shouldn't store things there. Cathy can transport these items as needed.

Cathy is going to buy a receipt book. Linda will get a stamp with CST, our address, email, and web page, to stamp receipts and other documents.

Rituals, Festivals

We need a BOD member to be a Pagan Pride Day. We'll have the CST display there, plus flyers and info for volunteers.

It was noted that we should personally invite Willow Blue, our registered agent in Georgia, to CST functions.

CST will set up a booth at FallFling on Saturday, from noon till 4:00 pm, for fundrasing, CST info, etc. We'll ask for volunteers to sit there, and perhaps have tarot readings, a kissing booth, or other similar activities. We can also have a silent auction.

In the FallFling second flyer, Linda will note the silent auction, and ask people to bring items for it. Also mention the booth, and bringing canned goods.

Web Page, Yahoogroups

We should ask our CST ministers if they want to be listed in the newsletter and on the web page.

We can have a prayer list on the web site, or on the Yahoogroups. We'll make a note of it in the newsletter, and Cathy will write an intro.

Memberships

How can we get more CST members? We can offer a discount at FallFling, a special rate of \$10 or \$15. Or, for officers, a discount could be available. Let's make it \$12.50 for Individual, and \$20 for Family memberships. These memberships will be good for one year. We'll make it a membership drive, between now and Samhain, and make it a yearly event, from Lammas to Samhain. We could ask Cori to talk to people and encourage them to join CST.

There was discussion about whether our volunteers should be paid members or not. It was decided that committee chairs or officers, etc., have to be paid members, but volunteers do not.

Upcoming Events

The next CST ritual will be Samhain, November 1. Since Cathy is not sure she can make it, we'll hold it at Cori's place in Troy, who volunteered earlier to have it. The ritual after that will be Yule, on December 20, either at Waverly or at William & Pelayah's house in Loachapoka (near Auburn). The dates for 2004 are set, but the locations are not.

Other Business

The next two BOD meetings were scheduled to be held November 2 and February 1 in Auburn, AL.

There being no other business the meeting adjourned at 4:20 pm.



The Corn Spirit

On the Back Porch With Nion

Reflections on a Life's Journey

Or How I Became a Pagan

(Editor's Note: This is an old article by Nion, one of our Board of Directors members, which was originally published in The Hazel Nut, Issue 13, February/March 1995.)

Hi ya'll, Nion here. I thought I would share with you my perspective on how I became a Pagan. Why, you may ask, would I want to do this? Well, my reasoning was that by putting my spiritual meanderings on paper, I can better understand and internalize my own present path.

I, as many Pagans have done in the past, started out in the Judeo-Christian faith, being brought up Roman Catholic. I even made altar boy for a while (ha!). My schooling was in parochial schools until my high school freshman year, so having the Brothers and Nuns (who, by the way, didn't believe in sparing the rod for infractions to authority) drum in the everpresent catechisms along with the three Rs was a daily occurrence.

But, about 4th grade and beyond, my religious utterances were really by rote with no true belief behind them. I just didn't feel anything inside when I said my 'prayers' or thought about 'sin' as a good little Catholic boy should. In fact, when confession time (a Catholic rite to become cleansed of willful sin) rolled around, the many many instances of juvenile self-abuse along with a little exaggerated story telling here and there made me well-acquainted with spouting acts of forgiveness and endless rosaries for penance. BUT IT DIDN'T MEAN ANYTHING to me. I just didn't feel or believe any of it, and since lightening didn't strike me down or the earth open and swallow me up, I guess I spiritually evolved as an agnostic.

When I became 18, I graduated from high school, and within three months joined the military to see the world. Uncle Sam gave me two years' paid vacation (which I couldn't even take) in sunny, muggy, and grubby Vietnam, where I very quickly lost what little I had left of religion and became thoroughly atheist. In my mind, there AIN'T NO GOD with all the blood, gore, death, and man's inhumanity to people that I saw those two years, and to me, NO all-mighty and ever-present deity could ever permit those or any other acts of violence and death in a religion's name or a god's name, no matter what faith it was from.

Well, I survived the military and actually stayed in for 20 years. I retired older, and probably not too much

wiser, still muddling along life's pathways. In the 20 years of military life and service here in the United States and many other countries, I have gone to other religious services to see what everyone had to offer. But I never found a niche that I found comfortable or spiritually 'filling.'

Nonetheless, there has always been some void that needed to be filled with something. Through the years, the closest I have come to peace was sitting on the Oceanside sand with the waves lapping at me; or running naked in the foam of the sea; or sitting on a rock contemplating the sunrise or sunset. Or listening to nature's constant chatter in a forest glade or a meadow, the wind rustling in the leaves and branches, the insects' buzz and drone, the birds or squirrels at play; or in observing the Southern Cross or the Milky Way on a crystal clear moonlit night. All of those instances have drawn me to Mother Nature as an entity that I could relate to and that I felt right with.

I guess I have always been a daydreamer, an avid science fiction nut, and a sword & sorcery fan. (Robert Heinlien was, is, and ever shall be, my hero, whose writings of lifestyles seemed to mirror how I wanted to live.) I always seemed to be somewhere else when I was supposed to be doing chores or classwork. I'd be the first one to go if E.T.s wanted our species for a goodwill exchange, or to live in space when it came time for everyone to be able to do so. Over the last 5 to 10 years, I have been reading more and more of New Age philosophy, the Occult, and other alternative lifestyles; and the writings of Raymond Buckland, Scott Cunningham (in particular), Margot Adler, Silver Ravenwolf, Amber K., the Farrars, and Starhawk have fascinated and appealed to me as a way of living and a way of relating to the environment, to others, and most importantly, to myself

About 18 months ago, I was browsing through the local weekend flea market, and a particular booth caught my eye. A young woman was selling pentagrams, ankhs, jewelry, bumper stickers, and weird books. I stopped and became fascinated with her wares, and took about 30-45 minutes working up the nerve to try and talk with her about my interest. (You must understand that I am smack dab in the middle of Bible Belt country). She was amiable for discussion, and in

Book Reviews:

Triumph of the Moon: A History of Modern Pagan Witchcraft, by Ronald Hutton. Oxford University Press, 2001, ISBN: 0192854496

Hutton's Triumph of the Moon is a cultural history of the modern Pagan Witchcraft movement in Britain. The book is split into two sections. The first examines the various philosophical, literary, anthropological and cultural forces that came together to bring about the birth of Pagan Witchcraft. The second section examines the early growth of this movement from its foundation in England to its spread throughout the world. The last three chapters look at distinctly American concepts in Pagan Witchcraft that have had a profound effect in Britain, as well as the modern stance of Pagan Witchcraft in Britain.

Hutton's book is a masterful work, bringing together a massive collection of sources to create a clear picture of the development of Pagan Witchcraft and its early growth. He has taken careful steps to locate documentation to support his narrative, despite the fact that many of these sources are held in private collections or are otherwise difficult to locate.

Triumph of the Moon is easy to read, although it is highly detailed and descriptive. This can become tiresome at times, although it is highly necessary to create a fair and well-supported picture. In fact, Hutton is so fair as not to directly deny many traditional myths within the Craft. Instead, he often paints several scenarios, discusses the likelihood of each, and leaves the reader to make his or her own decision based on the evidence that is present. And yet when the evidence is clear, he quickly points out the facts.

Hutton states that the book is a history of Pagan Witchcraft in Britain. However, it should be on the reading list of all Pagans. Although it is not an 'easy' book, it does tell the true story of the re-birth of Paganism, and dispels myths that many Pagans still hold today (such as the "Burning Times," and prehistoric Universal Goddess Religion). I cannot emphasize this enough: This should be the next book you read on Paganism and Witchcraft. And believe me, that is not something I say lightly.

Hutton is Professor of History at the University of Bristol, and is renowned for his works on history and Paganism, with such books as The Pagan Religions of the Ancient British Isles: Their Nature and Legacy, Shamans: Siberian Spirituality and the Western Imagination, and Stations of the Sun: A History of the Ritual Year in Britain.

Creating Home Sanctuaries with Feng Shui: Sacred Spaces, Alters and Shrines by Shawne Mitchell with Stephanie Gunning. New Page Books/ A Division of Career Press. ISBN 1-56414-570-0, \$14.99.

If you haven't read this one on Feng Shui, then you should. It was easy to read and understand. I sat down and read the first 100 pages without stopping. There are tips for clearing clutter, energetic space clearing, and creating your own sacred space. It is the only book that hasn't left me confused about the "what and where" of Feng Shui. The bagda shown in the book is very simple to apply to each room or space, be it home, yard or garden. Mitchell and Gunning also give information on Angels, Archangels, chimes, crystals, music, incense and essential oils. I am crazy about this book and consult it often. I think that you will enjoy it too. So next time you're in the market for a good book or one on Feng Shui, you should try this one. NOTE: This ritual is at a different location: we've had 2 rituals there so far, and they've been well-attended. We'd like to encourage all our pagan friends in south Alabama and north Florida to please come join us! Also, Troy is only 2.5 hours from Bham, and 1.5 hours from Auburn, so it's not really that far for more northerly folks. Cori has plenty of camping space, so feel free to bring a tent!



Please, **NO DOGS ALLOWED!** Cori has a very large wolf/dog, and a couple of other dogs, who don't get along with other dogs too well. Also, **PLEASE** keep an eye on your children! The dogs will be contained safely, but kids should not go to the dog pen to pet the "puppies" at all.

A potluck dinner will follow after the ritual at the same location. **PLEASE SEE GUIDELINES BELOW!** We're a long way from civilization, so bring plenty of ice, drinks, cigarettes, snacks, and food. There will not be time after the ritual to run into town for food and still get back for the potluck.

Our Rules for Potluck:

1. If you don't bring something to contribute, please don't eat! Or, you can wait till **EVERYONE** else has gotten a plate, then you may eat if there is food leftover.
2. **BRING A DISH** (general rule is to bring enough to feed 8 people) for the pot-luck, plus whatever you want to drink (bring an ice-box). You may cook your food on-site when you get there - Cori has a full kitchen, so you may re-heat or actually cook there if you need to. **PLEASE BRING REAL FOOD**, not just bread, cookies, raw veggies, or sweets!
3. So that we don't get stuck with nothing but cake and chips, please follow this guideline: If your last name starts with: A-G bring veggie/grain dishes (cooked, not just raw veggies!); H-O, bring meat dishes; P-T, bring appetizers (including raw veggies and fruits), salads, or breads; or U-Z, bring desserts. Also, please email Cori at <cori_tindragon@hotmail.com> with what you're bringing, so we don't get too much of the same thing.

If you'd like, you can bring a tent and camp

out Saturday night. Also, be sure to bring lawn chairs (we don't have very many chairs), and any other supplies you may need for the pot-luck or for camping. We may get a fire going, so bring your drums and marshmallows!

The Church of the Spiral Tree (CST) is a non-profit, volunteer-staffed, ecumenical pagan/wiccan church, designed to foster and celebrate a sense of community and family among pagans, both locally and in other regions of the country/world. CST celebrates the unique pagan family: parents, children, elders, and extended family. It is an ecumenical church in that it encompasses all traditions, and is non-exclusive. CST was incorporated in August 1997 to provide a legal, tax-exempt status to the Pagan community. This status enables us to offer to the community a variety of open rituals that anyone may attend, to ordain ministers, and to extend our tax-exempt status to sub-groups of CST. One of our projects has been the forming of a Pagan cover school program for homeschooling families in Alabama (Sacred Grove Academy). CST also has a Disaster Relief Fund, so we can collectively donate money in the name of an established Pagan church to disaster relief efforts, including the American Red Cross.

CST offers regular rituals on the sabbats, and occasional full moon rituals. Membership in Church of the Spiral Tree is not required to participate in our rituals; however, if you like us enough to come to several rituals and gatherings, we encourage you to join as a paid member of CST. Your membership fee helps pay for the ritual supplies, supplies for the gatherings, postage for mailouts, and helps support the web page. You also get that warm fuzzy feeling that comes from knowing you're supporting a worthwhile group that you yourself like, appreciate, and patronize!

Membership in Church of the Spiral Tree is open to everyone (under 18 may join the Church as Youth Members upon filing a Youth Membership Form which includes a signature of parent or guardian granting permission and approval), regardless of ethnic group, previous religious affiliation, gender or sexual orientation.
